Bird List & Guide - Treehouse Tulum H2Ojos



## Welcome to H2Ojos Birdwatching Guide!

Right in the vibrant jungle of Tulum, our treehouse is surrounded by one of the richest wildlife corridors in the Yucatán Peninsula. This area is recognized as one of the top birdwatching hotspots with more than 550 species, 145 have already been spotted right here in Dos Ojos Park.

This guide highlights a curated selection of twenty species frequently observed from our observation tower, terraces, and jungle trails. All photos were taken by our talented guests over the past year.

**1. Collared Aracari** (*Pteroglossus torquatus*)

Like many on the list, they love the fruit of the Guarumo tree.

**2. Keel-billed Toucan** (*Ramphastos sulfuratus*)

Unmistakable calling (Frog-ish) can be heard almost daily. Mainly seen on the high Canopy from the Observation Tower.

**3. Turquoise-browed Motmot** (*Eumomota superciliosa*)

Its pendulum-swinging tail makes it easy to recognize.

**4. Black-headed Trogon** (*Trogon melanocephalus*)

Very Active during the Day. Short and Rapid Hunts.

**5. Lineated Woodpecker** (*Dryocopus lineatus*)

I love listening to their drumming, one of my favorite sounds.

**6. Altamira Oriole** (*Icterus gularis*)

Typically seen in pairs and fly in quick, jerky movements. They are never seen walking on the ground.

**7. Yucatan Jay** (*Cyanocorax yucatanicus*)

Quite noisy and usually moves in large groups.

**8. Ferruginous Pygmy-Owl** (*Glaucidium brasilianum*)

Don't let their tiny size fool you, they are ferocious predators capable of taking prey larger than themselves.

**9. Social Flycatcher** (*Myiozetetes similis*)

Constantly active, one of the most frequently seen.

**10. Great Kiskadee** (*Pitangus sulphuratus*)

Noisy, very common, easy to identify.

**11. Black-crowned tityra** (*Tityra inquisitor*)

Unique nesting behavior where they take tree cavities previously excavated by woodpeckers.

**12. Boat-billed Flycatcher** (*Megarynchus pitangua*)

Diurnal, frequently on the move, often found in pairs.

**13. Yucatan vireo** (*Vireo magister*)

It is known for its mimicry of other birds songs.

**14. Plain chachalaca** (*Ortalis vetula*)

Very loud, raucous calls and usually move in groups.

**15. Melodious blackbird** (*Dives dives*)

Can be seen foraging on the garden looking for insects.

**16. Rose-throated becard** (*Pachyramphus aglaiae*)

Generally quiet, especially when alone.

**17. Golden-fronted woodpecker** (*Melanerpes aurifrons*)

Commonly seen around the parking/entrance.

**18. Green Jay** (*Cyanocorax luxuosus*)

Beautiful (One of the few I have not seen personally).

**19. Olive-throated Parakeet** (*Eupsittula nana*)

Often flying in flocks up to 30 individuals.

**20. Collared Forest-Falcon** (*Micrastur semitorquatus*)

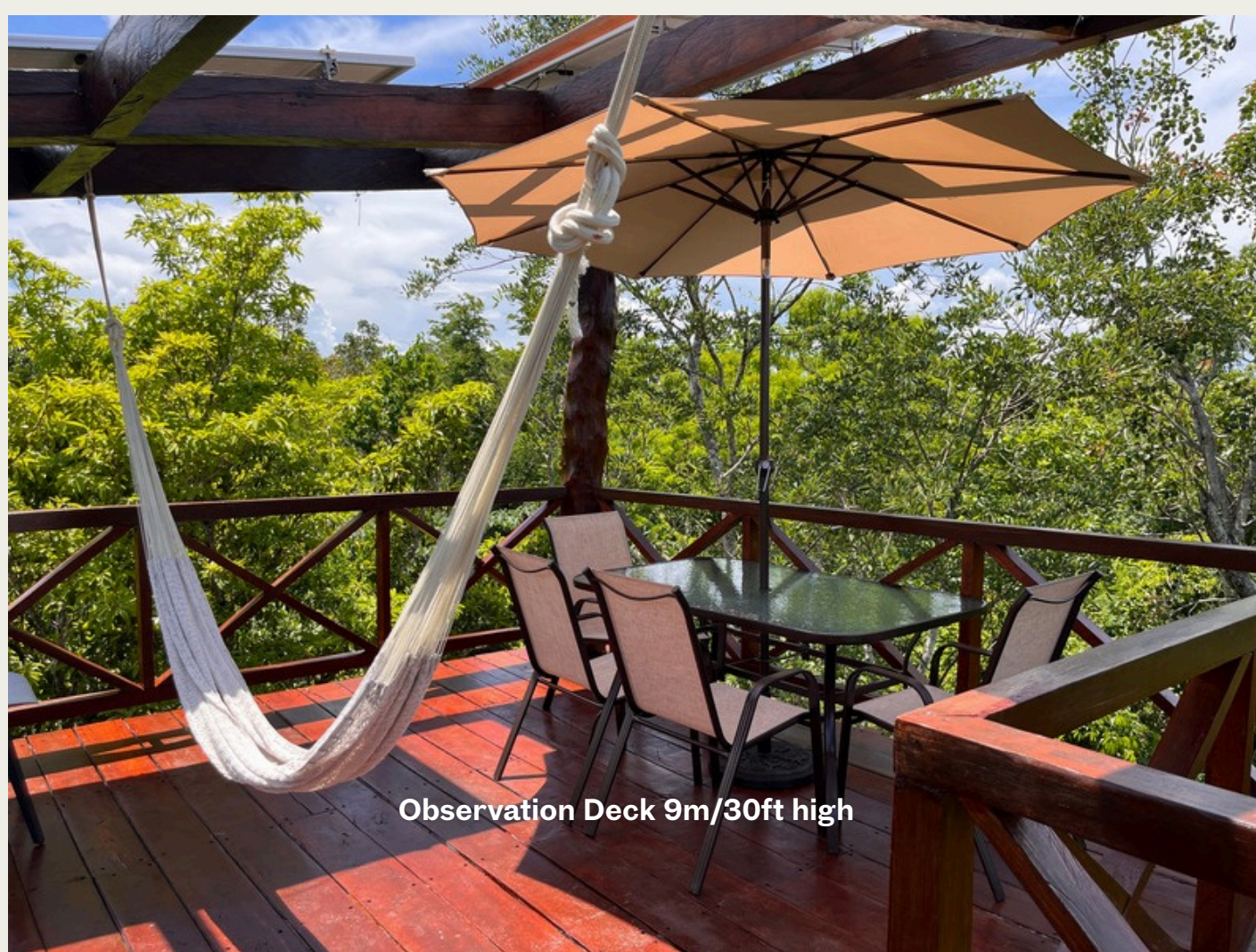
Large elusive raptor, heard more than it is seen.

★ Recommendations ★

**Best Times:** 6:30–8:30 AM and 4:45–6:45 PM (golden hours)

**Where to Look:** Observation tower, room terraces, and surrounding jungle paths.

**Tips:** Move slowly, stay quiet, and scan branches from low to high. Listen first - then look.

**Don't Forget:** Camera, water bottle, and binoculars  
(Binocular rentals available on-site).

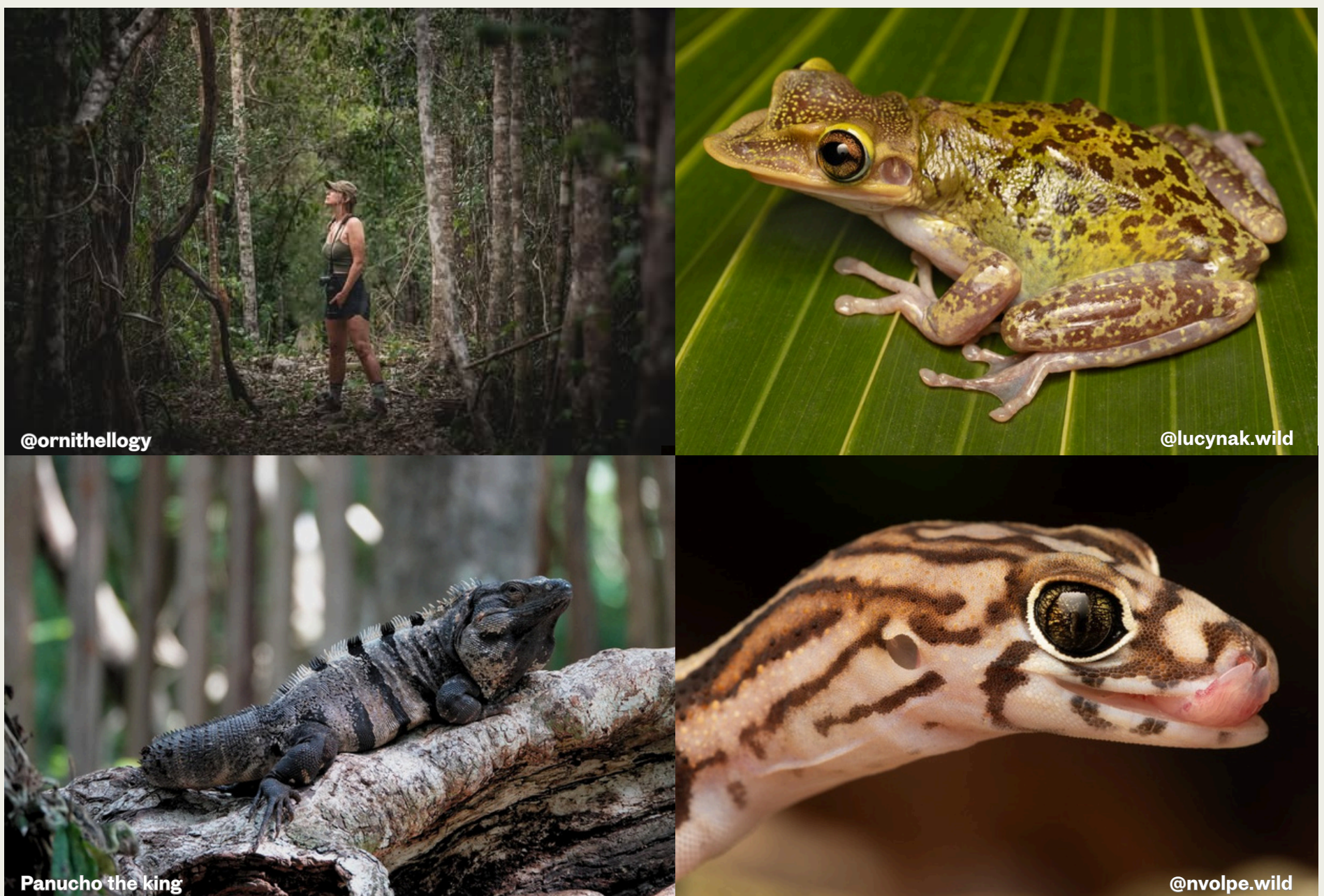
